

Critical Thinking for Today's School Leaders

Critical thinking has always been a prized attribute of leadership, but over the years, especially as assessments have become more and more high stakes, leadership professional development has emphasized quantitative skills over qualitative ones, dropping critical thinking by the wayside. Now as the complexity of the role of the school principal rises, the need for critical thinking resurfaces. As I finish out my third year as a school principal and complete the Rice Educational Entrepreneurship Program (REEP) through the Owens School of Business of Rice University, I have realized the magnanimous responsibility school leaders have in shaping the environment. influencing behavior, focusing attention on issues critical to the organization, and providing key frames to our communication. The principal is they key member of a school community that keeps teachers' and students' focus on learning with a sense of urgency that there is no time to waste.

We must give teachers permission to take risks and support them when they fail. Teaching is a profession that is both an art and a science. Every professional artist or scientist fails during the artistic or scientific inquiry process. Teachers must be given the opportunity to critically think outside of the box as they focus on how to meet the multiple needs of the learners in their classroom. The ability to solve problems and think critically are key characteristics of risk takers, and with almost every risk, there is a high probability of failure. Failure is not the end; it is just the beginning of a breakthrough. We need to encourage our teachers to take risks and support them in their risk taking efforts. As principals, we need to give teachers

quality feedback on identified areas of growth, recognize their effort and desire to improve, and celebrate their successes.


- As critical thinkers, we need to question our assumptions about practices that are "the way we've always done it". We need to inquire about the what and the why behind every practice and proposition. We need to foster the best critical thinking because it forces us to question the how and why of our effectiveness and our academic achievement results. Our schools are so diverse that we need to take advantage of so many divergent thinkers with varying perspectives. Collaboration allows the best problem solving to emerge, valuing the experiences and precious insights of all
- It is so important that we see the potential in our students by hearing their voices and gaining their perspectives. Many times we may see situations as obstacles, where our students see opportunities to try something new or revamp our processes. Students need to be goaloriented at a young age. They need to be purposeful and informed when they make decisions so that they know the difference between facts and opinions. Over and over again we hear that students are entering the workforce with lacking skills in logic and common sense. A large part of our curriculum is based on critical thinking and problem solving in the content areas so we need to continue to apply those skills in real-world situations. The reality is that we must empower students to become critical thinkers who are continually learning and who can apply their new knowledge to complex, novel, open-ended challenges. We want students who will be prepared to enter the workforce confidently and competently throughout their lives and at work.
- In a global, interconnected world of so much rapid change and uncertainty, there is one constant: we must be comfortable with managing ambiguity. We may never understand or be knowledgeable about everything there is to know in our field of education, but we must be able to make decisions through critical thinking. We need to be sharp critical thinkers who can size up a situation, realize potential where others may not, and seize opportunities through prompt decision-making. As leaders in education, we must encourage these same

skills in our teachers and in turn, our teachers in our students.
